Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed
June 7th 1832.

State of Virginia
Lincoln County 3rd 18

On this the 16th day of October 1832

personally appeared in open Court, before the Justices
of the Court of Pleas and quarters for the County
and State aforesaid now sitting Peter Cundbert a
resident in the County & State aforesaid aged twenty
three years who being first duly sworn according to
Law, doth on his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress
passed June 7th 1832,

That he entered the service of the United States
under the following name, officer, and served as
herein after stated (that is to say), he entered the
service of the United States as a volunteer, at the long
Island ^{in the State of Virginia} of North Carolina under Captain Isaac Bledsoe, whose
company was, with several others ~~and~~ under the com-
mand of Capt. Russell as well as he recollects the parties
what day & month he does not recollect, and in which
he entered the service, = He volunteered at this time
for the term of six months, ~~and~~

~~and~~ ~~he~~ ~~remained~~ ~~in~~ ~~service~~
at the long Island, until some ^{time} after the treaty of ~~the~~
at the long Island, and acted as a guard ~~during~~
the term in which the treaty was concluded =
The particular time at which he was discharged
he does not ^{recollect} but it was in the year 1788 as well as he
recollects, it was the same year in which the Treaty
of ~~the~~ ^{at the long Island} was concluded he remained at long
Island during said term of six months as a frontier
guard, = After he quit this service, he continued

to act as a courier required without having interest
into any regular service; as a scouting party,
until sometime in the year 1779 - at which time, he
was called into service in Capt. Anderson's Company
for one month to guard Blackmores Station, which
term of service, he performed at said Station, after
which term expired, he was relieved by an other
Company; after this time he went to Cumberland
River, which he arrived at the place of Fort
Mashalls Landing two days before Christmas 1779 -
and has lived in the County of Blaine and
Sumner, ~~since~~ ever since - in which latter County
he now lives. He further states, that he went from
Cumberland to Kentucky in the year, 1782, as well
as he recollects, and when arrived there orders had
just been issued by Col. Benj. Logan, for men to go
against the Indians, he volunteered under Col
Logan, and marched to the Blue Lick, but before
they arrived ~~at the~~ ^{at} the place, Col. Trigg, who
had gone on after the Indians, got defeated there -
and before they arrived the Indians were gone -
they arrived at the Blue Lick, in time to assist
in burying the dead - which was about two days
after the battle. He thinks he was and this time arrived
~~he recollects~~ ^{he recollects} two or three weeks, he thinks this defeat
was in the fall of ^{or Summer} 1782, he has no documentary
evidence of the service aforesaid, his discharge
he has lost, or destroyed, there is no person living by
whom he can prove the service aforesaid for the
term of six months, but for the term of one month
at Blackmores Station, he can prove his service
by George Blackamore, who was in the Station
at that time, as a drummer. This Station was ~~at~~
was kept built & named after his Father John
Blackamore. He was living about fifteen miles above

the long Island an Station, at the time he first volunteered
 He hereby relinquish his every claim or pretence to any
 pension or annuity except the present and declares
 that his name is not on the Pension Roll of any
 State in the Union,
 Given to and subscribed ^{in open court} this day and a year after aid

 that the above named applicant was a revolutionary
 Soldier and served as he states - ^{from Edmiston}
